



Jorge Ramirez and James Goode, who work with Southern Corrosion, were in Selma recently, adding town logos to the water tower behind the elementary school as well as the one near the oil terminals on Oak Street. "Calm" seemed to be the word of the day when they described how they first anchored their "spider" to the top of the tank which then carried them up and down the tower until they finished. They have a template that they use to establish the outline of the logo (which takes them about 6 hours), but beyond that, their work is freehand (at least an 8 hour job). They describe this job (working straight up on the outside of a 200 ft. tank) as a piece of cake compared to being assigned to paint the INSIDE of a tank – which requires an entirely different mindset. People with claustrophobia need not apply.

Reggie Barnes Donates Basketball Court

Mr. Reggie Barnes recently appeared before the Town Council with the offer of a surprise gift – a new outdoor basketball court for Blackley Athletic Park on the Harrison Campus.

Mr. Barnes was born and raised in Selma and graduated from SSS in 1985. He was a 3-Time MVP recipient, the '85 CAP-8 Conference Player of the Year, Metro Player of the Year, 1st Team All-Conference, and 1st Team All-East. He finished his high school basketball career as the 3rd leading scorer in CAP-8 history.

Reggie was the first SSS player to play at the NCAA Division 1 Level. He chose to play for head coach Jeff Mullins at UNC-Charlotte where as a four-year letterman, he played in over 100 games. He graduated in 3 ½ years with a degree in Human Services/Psychology and a minor in African-American Studies.




The total cost of this project is \$59,311.00 which includes the court construction, backboards, goals, fencing, and is expected to be completed this fall.






ADA RAILROAD STATIONS PROGRAM







All Amtrak stations must be made ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) accessible. The ADA Stations Program is charged to bring all station components, for which Amtrak has responsibility including Selma, into compliance. The chart shown above identifies several improvements including a wheel chair lift enclosure (WCLE). Although the Town of Selma owns the railroad station, the Department of Transportation owns the land. The Council has been told the work should be completed some time in September. We are very excited about this major upgrade to our platform area.

THE BIDS ARE IN & WE ARE READY TO GO!!!!



In our last edition of *The Selma Insider*, we told you about a Golden Leaf Grant that Selma received in order to begin repair of sewer lines damaged by recent hurricanes. The low bid of \$574,154.55 for this work was offered by KRG Utilities, Inc. from Lenoir, NC (near Boone). This work will rehabilitate approximately 3900 feet of sanitary sewer line. Mr. JP McCann, Director of Public Works, expects the work to begin by the first week in September. The streets to be affected include Lizzie, Massey, Richardson, Sharpe, Sumner, Temple, Waddell, and Webb.

And We Are Going After More Grants This Fall!!



- 1. reapplying for a \$2 million CBDG (Community Based Development Grant) from the federal government to continue our work on repairing the sewer lines. We are losing approximately \$650,000 a year in excess sewer treatment fees, so the sooner we can get these lines fixed, the sooner we can use that money for other needs.
- 2. applying for \$3 million of ASADRA monies which is a state revolving loan/grant fund. We are hoping for a 75% forgiveness in a loan situation. This money would also be used to repair the aging sewer lines.
- reapplying for AIA (Asset Inventory and Assessment) grant which will fund an hydraulic study (water lines) and inventory system for water and sewer as well. This grant would give us \$150,000 for water and \$150,000 for sewer.

So, in total, on behalf of the citizens in Selma, the Council, with the assistance of Mr. JP McCann and WithersRavenel Engineering, is now in the process of applying for \$5,300,000 in grant funds.


