Town Manager Delivers FY 20-21 Proposed Budget

Council has reviewing next year's budget provided proposal Town Manager, Steven Hicks, and Finance Director, Rhonda Sommer, Some of the highlights include funding for paving of some currently unpaved streets, resurfacing of some streets that need repair, a significant project to add and repair sidewalks, the hiring of a town engineer, improvements to entranceways to town, the hiring of a custodian and the elimination of current contracted services, and a facility upgrade to the Customer Services area in Town Hall. After final review, we will call for a public hearing, probably in early June and the budget will be available on the Town website. The law requires that the budget be adopted by July 1 each year.


New Home For Our Museum

In November, 2019, the Town Council voted to lease this 'Old Town Hall," one of Selma's most iconic buildings, to the Selma Museum which is now located on Anderson Street. Currently, the town is pursuing funds for limited renovation, including a new heat/ac system and a new small restroom, both of which need to be installed prior to the move.



KS Bank Under Renovation

Harold Keen, President & CEO of KS Bank, has announced the renovation of the Selma office, virtually rebuilding the facility. The outside will get new windows and a roof replacement to feature a modern metal roof. Inside, all walls are being replaced to eliminate any hazardous materials used in the original building and also to upgrade the facility to meet current handicap standards. In the end, the building will be the same size with the same exterior walls. But otherwise, it will look like a completely new building!



Located on the corner of South Raiford and East Anderson Streets, the Person-Vick Building was constructed in 1916 as the medical offices of Dr. James Person and Dr. George Vick. Recently, AdVenture Development Co. (the developers of the Eastfield Project) purchased the building and, after an extensive renovation, plans to put a retail store on the first floor, their offices on the second floor, and open a restaurant in the building which adjoins it on Raiford Street.





Preservation Group Takes Option on Historic Church

Founded in 1939, Preservation North Carolina's mission is to protect sites important to the diverse heritage of North Carolina. This group acquires endangered historic properties and then finds purchasers willing and able to rehabilitate them. This past March, they took a one-year option on the historic Selma Baptist Church, originally completed in 1908. They have set the purchase price at \$165,000. The building is eligible for historic tax credits and is in the Opportunity Zone.

JR's In Transition To Become A Food Hall and Meeting Center

JR's Cigar Warehouse continues to be renovated as it becomes The Old North State Food Hall owned by AdVenture Development. The food hall expects to have 10 vendors, plus a craft beer taproom called the North Carolina Craft House specializing in small breweries from around the state. The food hall will take up about 13,000 sq. ft. and has 23 ft. ceilings. The craft house will be located in the old humidor. Work is progressing and the opening is expected this fall.





New Tank Coming to Oil Terminal

On March 10th, the Town Council granted a special permit to Magellan Terminal Holdings to construct a new tank at the rear of their existing tank farm at 4414 Buffalo Road in Selma. The new tank will be 128 ft. in diameter by 50 feet tall with a storage capacity of approximately 110,000 barrels which equals 4.6 million gallons of petroleum. The developers have met all local site and fire code requirements as required by Selma's Technical Review Committee.

A Charming Place to Be!!





The phrase, A Charming Place To Be, was once Selma's official slogan. Our new slogan "The Crossroads of Tradition and Innovation" may be more representative of where we are now, but we still want Selma to be "charming." Sometimes when trash cans remain by the curb for days or they are overloaded with unacceptable materials, "charming" is not necessarily the first thought that comes to mind. The Council believes some citizens may not know the town's rules, so here is a reminder.

Notes from our trash contractor

- ✓ No loose trash should be outside the can.
- ✓ Please bag your trash in the regular container.
- ✓ Please keep you cans at least 3 feet apart and also away from parked cars and mailboxes so the truck arm can pick them up.
- Bulk items that are too large to be placed in cans will be picked up on a different day.
- ✓ Bulk items include furniture, mattresses, appliances with Freon removed. Items infested with bed bugs or other insects will not be removed.
- ✓ Construction debris, car parts, or house cleanouts <u>will not be picked up</u> unless the owner is willing to pay a separate fee. Please notify the town if you need this special service. Otherwise, these items are not to be placed by the curb.
- ✓ The Recycling Container cannot be a backup
 to the regular trash container. We pay
 additional money for recycled service and will
 be penalized if items that cannot be recycled
 are in the recycle can.
- ✓ <u>Acceptable recycling</u> items include paper, glass, metal, and plastic. Boxes should be broken down before being placed in the container.

The Town of Selma Zoning and Code Enforcement Office has announced the creation of a Grass and Code Enforcement Committee as part of an overall Town appearance improvement effort.

Violations may also be reported using SeeClickFix, a free download for iPhones and Android mobile phones. (See our website for more info.)

Town of Selma Regulations

- Mobile containers shall be placed within five (5) feet of the curb or street edge, but MAY NOT BE PLACED IN THE STREET.
- The containers shall be placed in the required location for collection no earlier than 4:00 pm the day preceding the designated pickup day and shall be removed from the curbside location no later than 8:00 am on the day after the container has been emptied.

 Based on this schedule, THERE SHOULD NOT BE ANY TRASH CANS BY THE CURB ANYWHERE IN TOWN ON THE WEEKENDS AFTER 8AM ON SATURDAY UNTIL 4PM ON SUNDAY.
- Regular trash containers and recycle material containers
 will be picked up on different days and therefore, both
 containers should not be by the curb on the same day.
- Except during these hours, the mobile containers and all other refuse (trash) containers shall be kept in a location no closer to the street than the front line of the residence (house).
- Reminders of the town's requirements will be placed on the receptacles and bins where violations are discovered, and fines of \$25 for noncompliance will be enforced when residents refuse to follow the regulations.
- It is the citizen's responsibility to know which days the different types of trash are picked up at their residence – household trash, recycle, and bulk items.
- Some other items that we need special help with include
 –Keeping Grass Mowed (height limit is 10 inches); Cars

 Parked at Residences on Grass
- These rules are not new (they were adopted decades ago when the town changed to curbside pickup), but for the past few years, they have not been enforced consistently.

Please help us keep Selma a "charming" place to live, work, and play.

Selma Receives \$824,370 Golden Leaf Grant

For years, the cost to process Selma's sewer has continued to rise rapidly. Everyone suspected that the problem was due to cracks in hundred year old sewer pipes that allowed rain water to get into the sewer lines and then is chemically treated as if it were regular sewer. Everyone also knew that fixing the problem was going to be expensive.

Currently the Town of Selma contracts with Johnston County to treat the town's wastewater. Selma estimates that of the 42.65 million gallons per day (MGD) of average monthly flow, only 54% of that is legitimate wastewater with the remainder being groundwater and surface water intrusions. Johnston County bills for the total flow delivered to its system, hence the excessive treatment expenditures.

Last Spring 2019, the Selma Town Council contracted with WithersRavenel (an engineering firm) to provide professional services to include investigating Selma's sanitary sewer collection system with an emphasis on mapping the collection system and performing a high-level assessment of the sewer lines. Because the Town had previous smoke testing results from several years prior, the investigation's new numbers showed that there had been significant damage from Hurricane Florence (and even more after Hurricane Dorian which occurred September 4-9, 2019).

Altogether there were 10 segments of sanitary sewer pipe affected by Florence/Dorian with a total pipe footage of approximately 4,400 linear feet. The map that appears below indicates the location of the damaged sewer lines. Although, there are many other areas in town that need work, this past fall, the Council with the assistance of WithersRavenel, applied for a *Golden LEAF Foundation* Grant to cover the damage caused by the hurricane. The cost to repair the identified pipe section was estimated to be approximately \$825,000. The breakdown, by location is shown below.



This spring (2020), the Council was notified by the Golden LEAF Foundation that the Town of Selma had been awarded the requested \$824,370. The Council is very happy to announce that the final plans are underway and expect that these specific sewer lines will be repaired this summer. Crews have already been in town taking final measurements prior to contracts. The Council greatly appreciates this funding and will be applying for a \$2 million federal grant in the fall to continue the work in other sections of town.



Town of Selma Receives \$466,953 For Union Station Renovation

One of Selma's key landmarks is our Selma Union Station. It is a visible reminder of the important role that the railroad has played in Selma. While the Town of Selma owns the building, the North Carolina Railroad Company (NCRR) owns the land on which it sits. The North Carolina Legislature has recently allocated \$466,953 for major repairs and upgrades to Selma Union Station which will begin this year.

This work will include items such as installation of a more efficient heating/air conditioning system, plaster repairs and painting, parking lot repairs and restriping, exterior lighting replacements, weather proofing of windows, improved signage, etc. Of importance to locals and travelers, a sprinkler system will be installed which will allow us to have a small café in the property. This will allow us to make greater use of the building and provide a unique and inviting gathering space for our town.

In addition to bringing passengers to Selma, the rails bring freight. One of our Selma industries, generally known as Bailey Feed Mill but is inclusive of its NSEW and STS II LLC subsidiaries, is a heavy rail user. Its silos have a prominent presence in our skyline.
